Roberto Alomar

- Born February 5, 1968 in Ponce, Puerto Rico
- Played in the MLB from 1988-2004
- Considered to be one of the best 2nd basemen
- Father, Sandy Alomar, Sr., was the bench coach of the NY Mets
- Older brother, Sandy Jr., was a MLB catcher
- Holds the record for the most Gold Gloves won then any other 2nd baseman
- Has the second most Silver Slugger Awards for a 2nd baseman
- Alomar is a switch-hitter and threw right-handed

Roberto Alomar's Awards

- 12 straight All-Star teams (1990-2001)
- Holds the record for 10 Gold Gloves at 2nd base
- Has batted over .300 nine times
- Posted over a .400 OBA five times
- Stole at least 30 bases eight times in a season
- 4 Silver Slugger awards
- Missed the Hall of Fame in 2010 by 8 votes

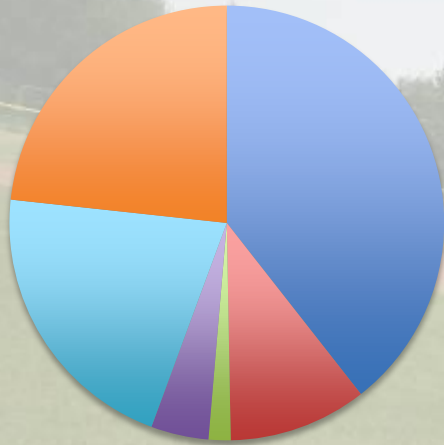
- Born September 18, 1959 in Spokane, Washington
- Nicknamed “Ryno”
- Played for almost his entire career with the Chicago Cubs from 1981-1997
- His nephew, Jared Sandberg, was a third baseman for the Tampa Bay Devil Rays
- Elected into the Hall of Fame in January 2005
- Currently he is the manager of the Iowa Cubs

Ryne Sandberg's Awards

- 10 consecutive All-Star appearances
- Won 9 consecutive Gold Gloves from 1983-1991
- Holds a MLB record with a .989 fielding percentage at 2nd base
- Inducted into the Hall of Fame on July 31, 2005
- On August 28, 2005 his number 23 was retired at Wrigley Field

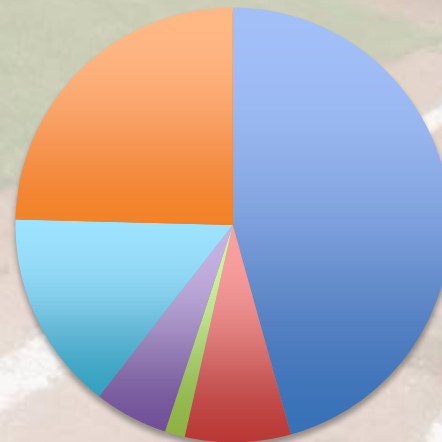
Pie Chart

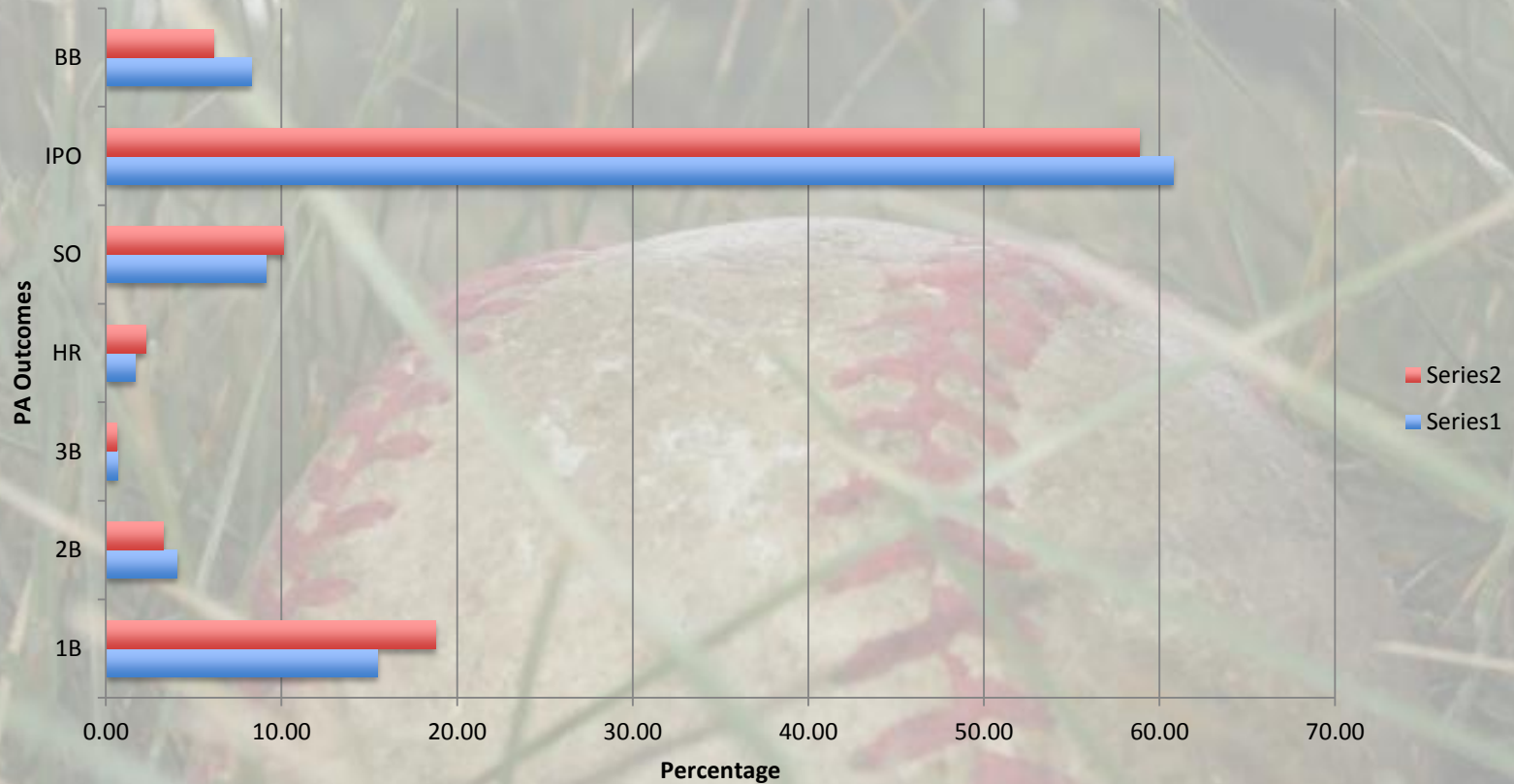

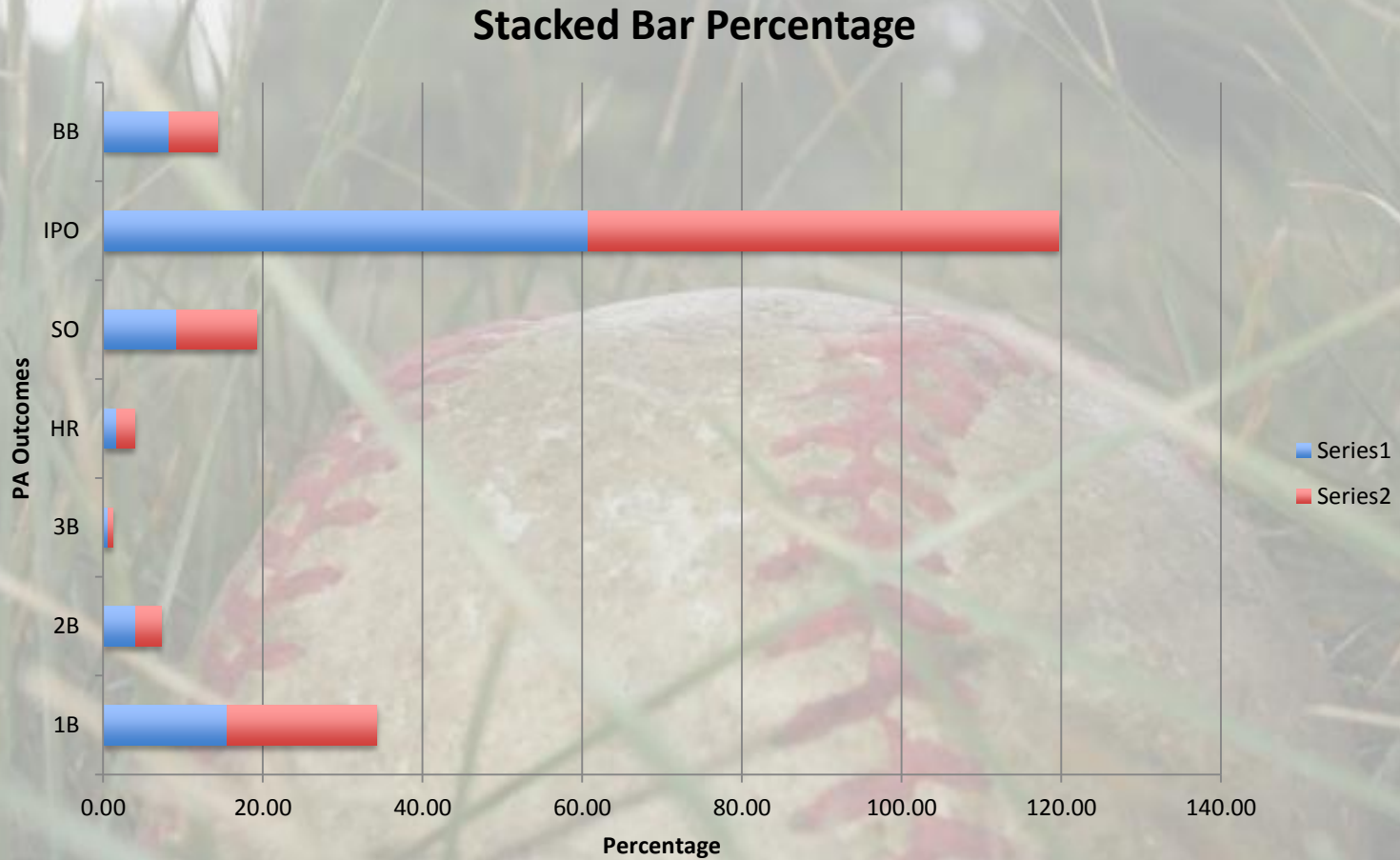

Side-by-Side Bar Graph

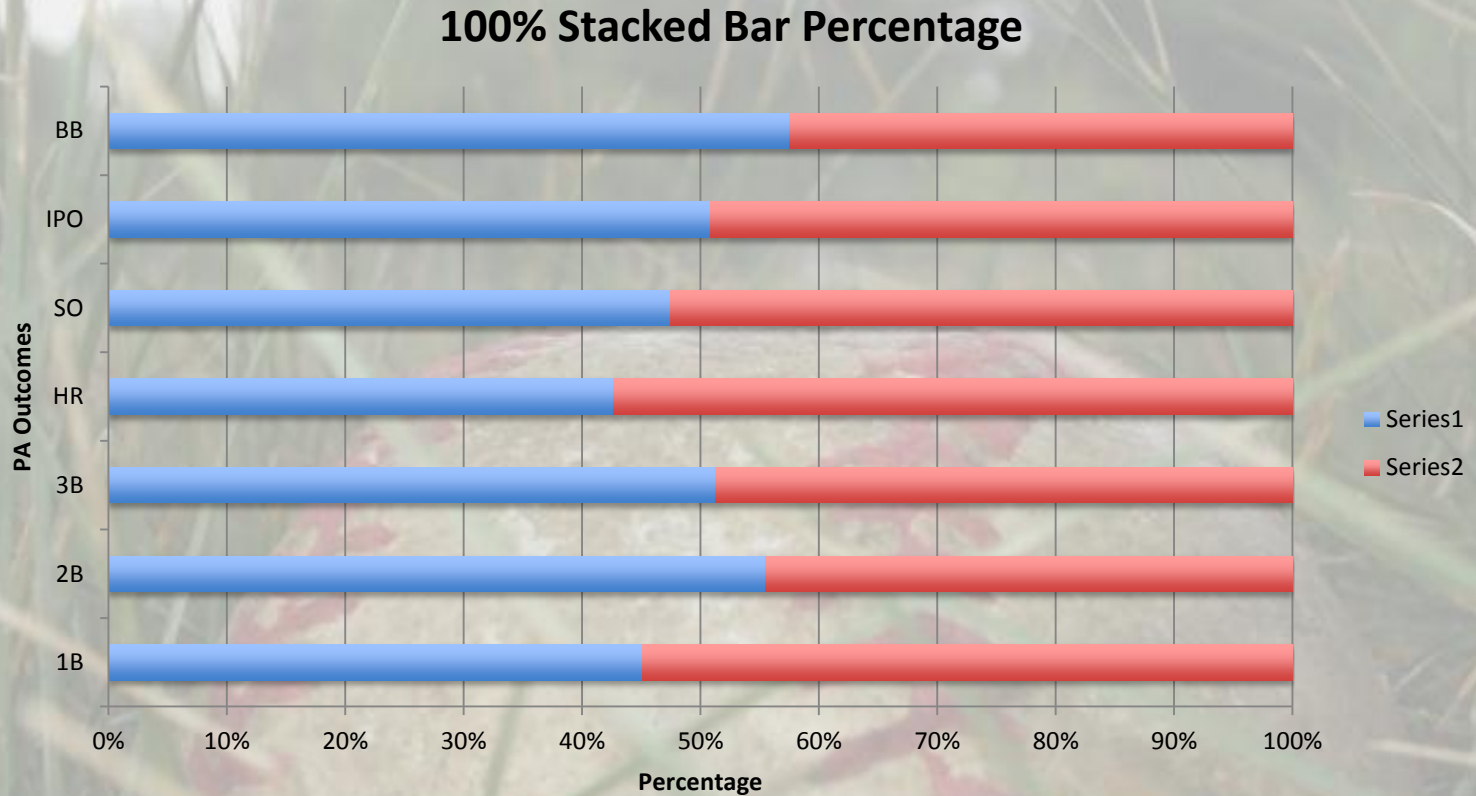
Side-by-Side Percentage



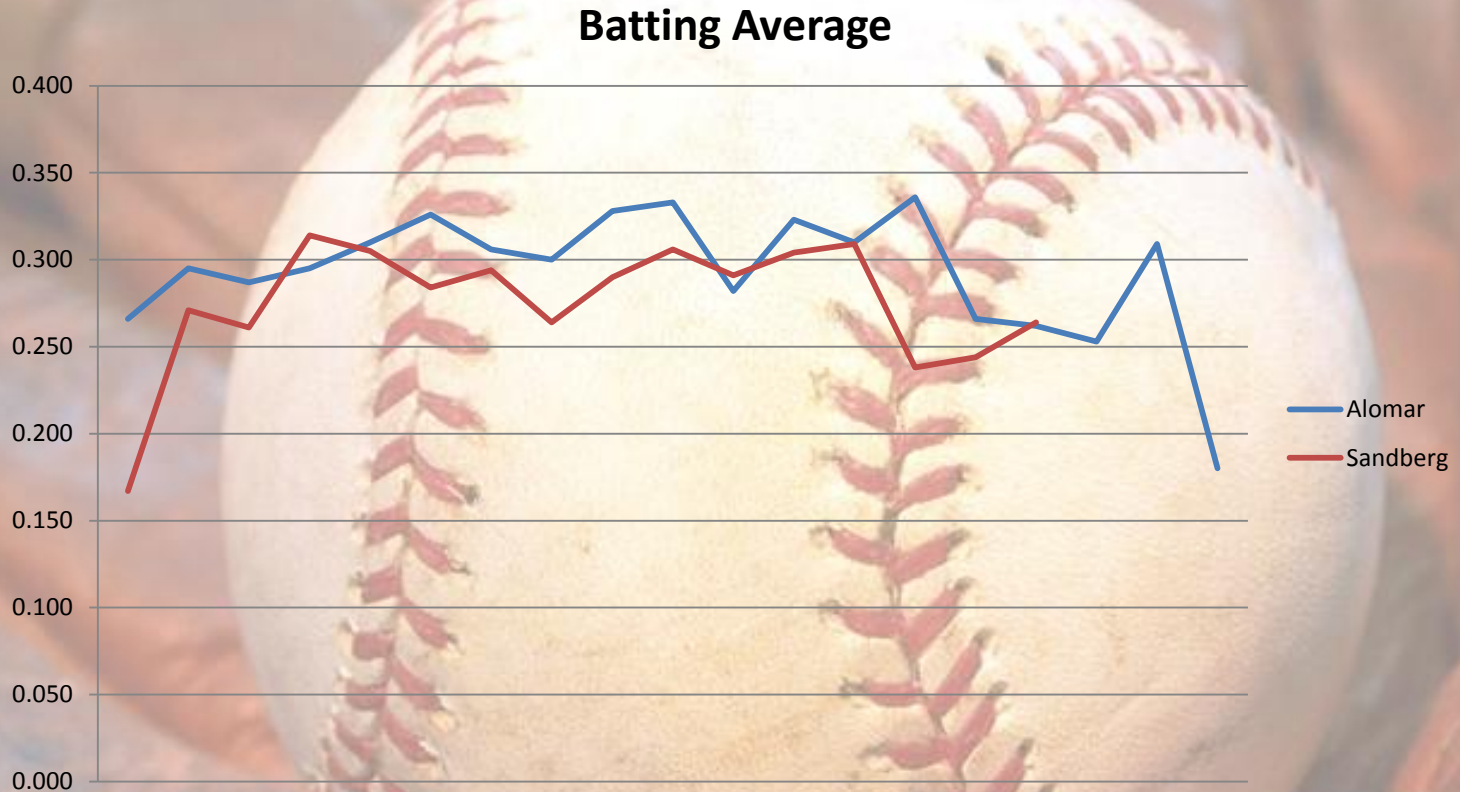
Stacked Bar Graph



100% Stacked Bar Graph



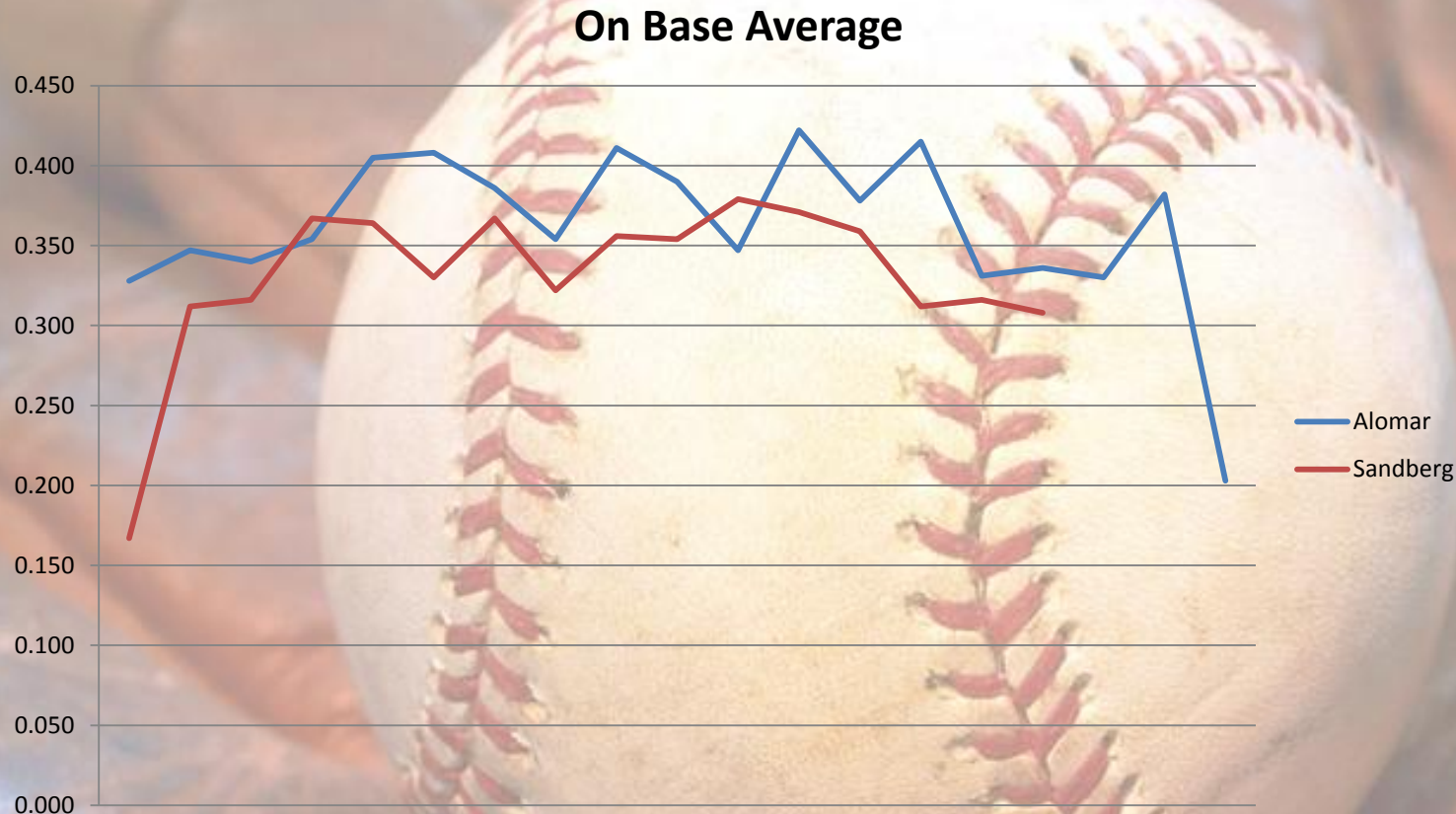

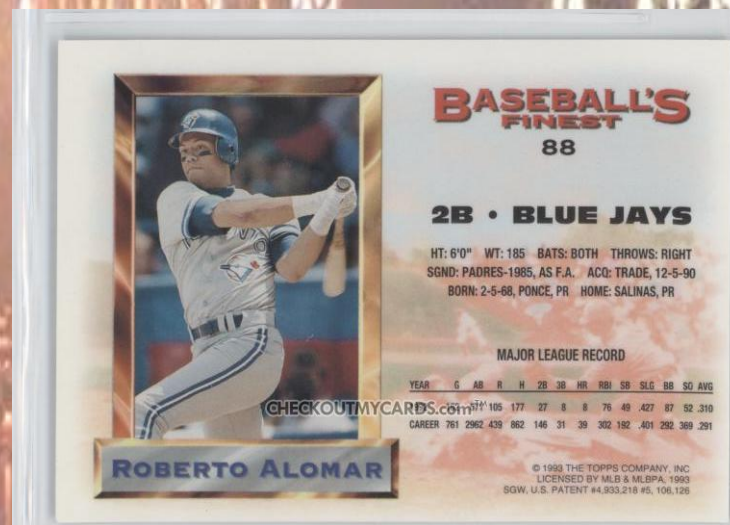
Closing Statement
